Appropriately delegates responsibility. Anticipates and responds diplomatically to cast and crew concerns. Gives a written critique of a film based on the film's production quality. Prepare and organizes shotlist, beat breakdown, storyboards, blocking diagrams and other materials that help illustrate the director's vision. Establishes a comfortable set protocol to use with cast and crew during production. Envisions and approves (or gets approval for) appropriate aesthetic elements that would enhance the story. Participates in each phase of filmmaking. Casts and directs actors to meet the story's need. Diplomatically communicates technical and aesthetic needs to the cast and crew. Observes the work of professional directors. Explores different shot variations, directing styles, and technology that contribute to the enhancement of the film. Responsibly anticipates and responds to cast and crew concerns. Makes creative decisions that maintain the integrity of the story. Gives a written film critique based on the film's directions. 	 A. Keeps crew safe from electrical hazards. Maintains and updates an operational gaffer's box. Responsibly delegates duties of the grip and electric crew. Organizes the crew and materials needed for the grip team. Explores different lighting manipulation methods, grip kit setups, and set safety rules and techniques. Remains aware of electricity distribution and lighting techniques. Observes the work of professional grips and gaffers. Gives a written evaluation of what makes a good grip and/or what a grip's responsibilities are to a production. Executes the gaffer's commands for lighting and safety support and the direct of photography's demands for camera support and manipulation equipment. Responsibly delegates duties to the grips crew.
